- A collegial and cooperative leadership and management style.


At the conclusion of their schooling our aim is that students will:

Boys:

Years 7-10

SUMMER UNIFORM

Black & white check princess line frock with shirt-maker collar and short, front button opening.

WINTER UNIFORM

Blouse:

<u>Gold</u> polyester loose fitting blouse.

Alternatively a <u>gold</u> penguin shirt may be worn, <u>not</u> lemon.

Skirt:

grey/black/check with gold pinstripe.

OR

black track suit pants (as per sports uniform).

Shoes: Full leather upper shoes that cover the whole foot. (see page 5)

Years 11 & 12

The black and white checked fabric used in the senior uniform is the same as is used in the junior girls uniform. However, the design has been changed. The uniform has three panels across the front and back, with a zipper opening at the back; and a zipper pocket.











Taree High polo and cotton shirts are available at Workwise Taree. They are proving very popular with our students.



Due to **Work Health and Safety Regulations** from the NSW Department of Education and Training the wearing of appropriate, protective footwear is a mandatory requirement for participation in **all practical lessons**

Appropriate Footwear: strong, leather shoes which cover the entire foot, have a strong grip sole and do not have a high heel.

Inappropriate Footwear : Shoes which do not protect the foot



BOYS' SPORTS UNIFORM

Sports Uniform:

- Gold polo / Gold tee shirts and black shorts.
- Black and gold tracksuit may be worn.
- Shoes joggers that cover the whole foot.



GIRLS' SPORTS UNIFORM

- Gold polo or Gold tee shirts
- All girls (7-12) have the option of wearing black shorts .The black skirt must be worn when representing the school in certain sports such as netball.
- Girls are permitted to wear their sports uniform instead of their normal summer uniform but are encouraged to wear this only on Wednesdays.
- However, girls must have a fresh change of clothes if they are participating in sport or PE.
- Shoes joggers that cover the whole foot.

SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS

If a sport has special dress requirements students are to change into these on arrival at the sport venue. eg Football jumpers, Swimmers, Gymnastic leotards.

PLEASE NOTE

If a sports uniform is not available for any reason, students are to wear normal school uniform and change into suitable clothing on arrival at sport.

PE UNIFORM

All students are required to change into sport uniform for PE lessons. A note must be provided to the teacher if a change of clothes is unavailable.

NOTE: Girls are permitted to wear their sports uniform instead of their normal summer uniform.

• However, participating students must have a fresh change of clothes if they are participating in PE.

ATTENDANCE

All students will be issued with an Absence Note Booklet. These booklets are the preferred method for applying for leave/late and explaining absences. These booklets have a butt which allows parents to retain a copy of the details of the leave/late or absence.

If a student has been absent for more than three days without an explanation a letter will be sent from the school as a matter of course.

Parents are requested to:

- Send a note with a pupil on the first day of returning to school after an absence.
- Phone/email the school if a pupil is to be absent more than one day.



LEAVE - no lunch passes.

To obtain a leave pass a student must

present a note with a legitimate reason signed and dated by their parent / carer at 8.30-9.00am at the office.

We do not issue lunch passes.

<u>Year 12 students</u> are granted the privilege that enables them to leave the school grounds at lunchtime everyday day or other days if they have finished all timetabled classes for the day.

<u>Year 11 students</u> are granted the privilege that enables them to leave the school grounds at lunchtime on <u>Tuesday</u> of each week or other days if they have finished all timetabled classes for the day.

BUS TRAVEL

Bus: All high school students must reside more than 2.0 kms radial distance or 2.9 kms walking distance from the school to be eligible for a bus pass. Exemption may be granted on medical grounds.

Private Car Conveyance: To be eligible for subsidy, students must live more than 1.6 km walking distance from the nearest transport bus pick-up point, by the nearest practicable route. Subsidy will only be paid if a special trip each morning and afternoon is made for this purpose.

Application forms for this will be available on the NSW Transport web page: *transportnsw.info/school-students* and to be filled out and returned to the school for further processing. It should be noted that all students must renew their application for subsidy when enrolling at High School. Changes of address must be notified immediately. The approval of your subsidy is subject to verification of the distances travelled.

LEAVING AGE

This is 17 years. Parents who wish to withdraw students under 17 should contact the Department of Family and Community Services, PO Box 62, Taree. (Phone: 6591 2100).

LEAVING SCHOOL

Written parental permission is required to allow any students to terminate their enrolment.

Students are <u>not</u> to leave the school grounds without permission.

Parents should not contact students directly on their mobile phones during school hours. If a message or collection is required then parents should contact the office.

Students are not to contact parents directly if they are ill or injured. They must report to the Office or Clinic to seek assistance to ensure their safety and well being. The school will then take the appropriate action and contact parents if necessary.

After school, bus travellers will line up in the appropriate places to await the arrival of their buses. They must not interfere with the free passage pedestrians along the footpaths, and must behave in an appropriate manner.	of

Students are to form a line from the yellow line adjacent to the kerb and enter their bus in an orderly manner.

No pupil is to alight from, or join, a bus downtown without permission from the Principal or Deputy Principal.

Students travelling by bus must obey the instructions of the driver and follow the code of behaviour outlined in the "School Students' Behaviour on Buses" Policy.

BICYCLES

Students riding bikes to and from school are to obey the traffic rules. All bikes are to be stored in the bike room provided off the main quadrangle. The room is locked during school hours.

STUDENT DRIVERS and Student Passengers in Cars Driven by Students:

Student drivers must obtain written permission from passengers' parents - a form is available from the Deputy Principal.

MOVEMENT ABOUT THE SCHOOL

When moving along corridors and staircases, students are to keep to the left and move in an orderly manner.

Students are to enter and leave buildings by the nearest door to the room to which they are going, or leaving. The front door of A Block is not an entrance/exit for students. The office, Principal and Deputies offices are only accessible through security doors. Unless otherwise directed, students may go straight into their normal classrooms where they are to sit down and get ready to commence the lesson.

Students are not permitted to enter specialist rooms until instructed to do so by a teacher.

Students are not allowed in the building before school, during recess or at lunchtime unless there is a teacher present or they are consulting with a teacher.

SPORT

Years 7 to 10 have sport on Wednesday afternoons. A Cross Country Run, Athletics and Swimming Carnivals are held annually. Some inter-school visits are organised

From a safety perspective, all students are expected to be able to swim at least 50 metres. Tuition in swimming is provided to all students who are unable to do so. No student is able to elect sports such as rowing, canoeing or surfing unless he or she can swim at least 400 metres.



Sport is divided into four segments on a term basis.

Participation in sport is **compulsory and student participation is required to fulfill Department of Education Training requirements**. Medical and other appointments should be scheduled for after school hours wherever possible.

Students with long term conditions which affect their capacity to participate in particular sports will, wherever possible, be assigned to appropriate sports. Parents should advise the school in writing if their child is unable to participate in sport due to illness or injury.

Notes pertaining to PE lessons should be presented to the student's PE teacher at the commencement of the lesson. These are recorded and filed.



SPORTS CARNIVALS

Attendance at Sports carnivals is compulsory. Students are encouraged to participate and wear House colours.

Information Literacy is about helping students find quality information suitable for their needs and is at the heart of the library program. THS library aims to prepare students for excellence in their school life and prepare them for success beyond school by providing a quality learning environment. The library is a shared space where students and staff work quietly and are considerate of others.

Did you know?

Our library has a collection of over 40,000 information resources including: World Book online database for high quality reference information Subscription to Sydney Morning Herald digital edition A huge collection of Fiction and Non Fiction books Articles, magazines, newspapers, audio books and more...

How to locate what you need for study or assignments.

Oliver library catalogue can be accessed from the terminals as you enter the library or you can access Oliver from the student portal online. All students have access to our catalogue and electronic databases from home or school. Look for the small purple square *Oliver* icon in the student portal or ask the friendly staff in the library.

Borrowing.

Resources can be borrowed for two weeks with the exception of reference and audio-visual materials, which are available to overnight loan. If resources become overdue students cannot borrow until they are either returned or reimburse the school for the cost of a replacement.

The library has a Printing Station which allows quick and easy printing for students. The library is reducing its impact on the environment by making printing school work free if it is printed black and white, and printed on both sides of the paper.

The library has 2 class areas with access to desk top computers and a pod of 30 laptops. These class areas have flexible furniture options and 2 interactive touch screens for teaching and learning. These areas can be booked by teachers.

The library also has a senior study area for individuals and groups and comfortable seating for casual groups.

There are 3 seminar rooms which can be booked for small groups.

The library is also home to the Careers Adviser, the School Support Officer, the Reading recovery program, the Video conference centre, and meetings and events as they arise.

Information Skills

The Teacher-Librarian, co-ordinates "Independent Learning Skills Program" for Year 7 students and provides ongoing assistance for students and staff with curriculum support resources and computer and internet use.

Each course will nominate a number of assessment tasks which will ensure students have the opportunity to demonstrate their level of achievement of the course outcomes. Students will be informed of these tasks on the course outline issued by their class teacher.

Students are required to:

- complete each assessment task to the best of their ability
- submit these on or before the due date. Late submission of tasks incur penalties.

If unable to complete a task students must:

- provide the relevant class teacher with a satisfactory explanation if they are absent when a task is completed. Such an explanation will usually require the provision of documentary evidence such as a doctor's certificate or parental note.
- such explanations should be provided before the due date of the assessment task.
- complete the same task at the earliest possible date where this is appropriate OR
- attempt a similar task and, if this is also inappropriate, then an estimate based on other evidence will be used.

Gifted and Talented Students:

Taree High School aims to educate all students to their potential and provide high quality educational outcomes for all students, including gifted and talented students (GATS). The school provides a framework that will identify, support, and develop the gifts and talents of all our students and enable all students to realize their potential abilities.

ACADEMIC INITIATIVES

A variety of procedures is adopted to identify students with gifts and talents and numerous programs are in place to cater for such students:

Many compulsory subjects (such as English, Mathematics and Science) provide extension classes for high achieving students with abilities in specific curriculum areas in Years 8-10.
