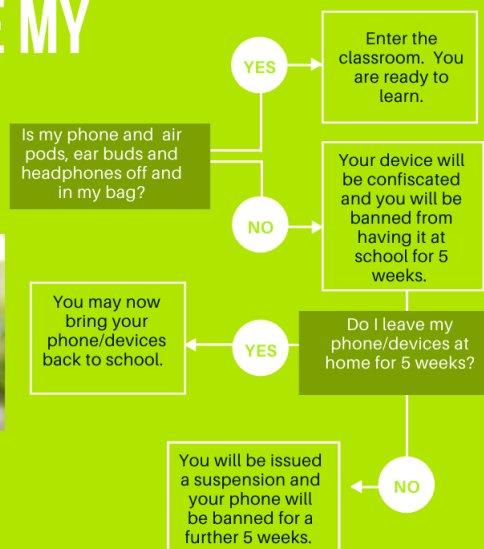
MOBILE PHONES

ATTENDANCE

All students will be issued with an Absence Note Booklet. These booklets are the preferred method for applying for leave/late and explaining absences. These booklets have a butt which allows parents to retain a copy of the details of the leave/late or absence.

If a student has been absent for more than three days without an explanation a letter will be sent from the school as a matter of course.

Parents are requested to:

- Send a note with a pupil on the first day of returning to school after an absence.
- Phone/email the school if a pupil is to be absent more than one day.

LEAVE - no lunch passes.

To obtain a leave pass a student must present a note with a legitimate reason signed and dated by their parent / carer at 8:30-9:00am at the office.

We do not issue lunch passes.

Year 12 students are granted the privilege that enables them to leave the school grounds at lunchtime everyday day or other days if they have finished all timetabled classes for the day.

Year 11 students are granted the privilege that enables them to leave the school grounds at lunchtime on Tuesday of each week or other days if they have finished all timetabled classes for the day.

BUS TRAVEL

Bus: All high school students must reside more than 2.0 kms radial distance or 2.9 kms walking distance from the school to be eligible for a bus pass. Exemption may be granted on medical grounds.

Private Car Conveyance: To be eligible for subsidy, students must live more than 1.6 km walking distance from the nearest transport bus pick-up point, by the nearest practicable route. Subsidy will only be paid if a special trip each morning and afternoon is made for this purpose.

Application forms for this will be available on the NSW Transport web page: transportnsw.info/school-students and to be filled out and returned to the school for further processing. It should be noted that all students must renew their application for subsidy when enrolling at High School. Changes of address must be notified immediately. The approval of your subsidy is subject to verification of the distances travelled.

LEAVING AGE

This is 17 years. Parents who wish to withdraw students under 17 should contact the School on 6552 1166 and speak with a Deputy Principal.

LEAVING SCHOOL

Written parental permission is required to allow any students to terminate their enrolment.

Parents should not contact students directly on their mobile phones during school hours. If a message or collection is required then parents should contact the office.

Students are not to contact parents directly if they are ill or injured. They must report to the Office or Clinic to seek assistance to ensure their safety and well being. The school will then take the appropriate action and contact parents if necessary.

BUS TRAVELLERS

Students who travel to school by bus are to proceed directly into the school grounds after their arrival.

After school, bus travellers will line up in the appropriate places to await the arrival of their buses. They must not interfere with the free passage of pedestrians along the footpaths, and must behave in an appropriate manner.

Students are to form a line from the yellow line adjacent to the kerb and enter their bus in an orderly manner.

No pupil is to alight from, or join, a bus downtown without permission from the Principal or Deputy Principal.

Students travelling by bus must obey the instructions of the driver and follow the code of behaviour outlined in the "School Students' Behaviour on Buses" Policy.

BICYCLES

Students riding bikes to and from school are to obey the traffic rules.

All bikes are to be stored in the bike room provided off the main quadrangle.

The room is locked during school hours.

STUDENT DRIVERS and Student Passengers in Cars Driven by Students:

Student drivers must obtain written permission from passengers' parents - a form is available from the Deputy Principal.

MOVEMENT ABOUT THE SCHOOL

When moving along corridors and staircases, students are to keep to the left and move in an orderly manner.

Students are to enter and leave buildings by the nearest door to the room to which they are going, or leaving. **The front door of A Block is not an entrance/exit for students. The office, Principal and Deputies offices are only accessible through security doors.** Unless otherwise directed, students may go straight into their normal classrooms where they are to sit down and get ready to commence the lesson.

Students are not permitted to enter specialist rooms until instructed to do so by a teacher.

Students are not allowed in the building before school, during recess or at lunchtime unless there is a teacher present or they are consulting with a teacher.

SCHOOL REPRESENTATION

From Term 1 2023 students will need to meet attendance, behaviour and uniform expectations to represent the school in extra curricular activities such as sporting and cultural teams, excursions and other community events. Students will need to maintain 85% attendance; have minimal negative behaviour referrals on Millennium; not be on any Monitoring Card other than purple (Mentor card) and wear their correct school uniform 90% of the time. Organisers of these events will monitor these expectations when selecting students for school representation.

SCHOOL CONTRIBUTIONS

TEXTBOOKS

All textbooks are issued on loan to students who then become responsible for keeping them in good condition. The books remain the property of the school and must be returned at the end of the year. Lost or damaged books must be

SCHOOL GROUNDS

Sensible behaviour is expected in the playground.

No bags are to be left in the playground between lessons.

Money and valuables should **NOT** be kept in school bags. If it is necessary for money to be brought to school, this should be left at front office for safe-keeping. School bags and other valuables may be left in a locked room.

Students should keep the playground in a neat and clean state.

GENERAL SCHOOL PROCEDURES

After School: Students are to go straight home from school and not loiter around outside the school or down town.

Toilet passes: Unless it is a matter of urgency, students will not be permitted to go to the toilet during lessons. If students have a medical condition requiring a pass they will need a doctor's certificate supporting this request.

Students not in class: Any student not in class (for whatever reason) should have a permission card or note from their teacher.

Students sent out of class: For misbehaviour are to report to the Head Teacher of that subject with a note stating the reason for the exclusion.

SMOKING/VAPING

Smoking or vaping will not be tolerated anywhere in the school grounds; outside on the footpath or in the park, opposite the school.

Students are not to smoke/vape while coming to, or going home from school, or while representing the school on visits, sporting trips, etc.

SPORT

Years 7 to 10 have sport on Wednesday afternoons. A Cross Country Run, Athletics and Swimming Carnivals are held annually. Some inter-school visits are organised

From a safety perspective, all students are expected to be able to swim at least 50 metres. Tuition in swimming is provided to all students who are unable to do so. No student is able to elect sports such as rowing, canoeing or surfing unless he or she can swim at least 400 metres.

Sport is divided into four segments on a term basis.

Participation in sport is **compulsory and student participation is required to fulfill Department of Education Training requirements**. Medical and other appointments should be scheduled for after school hours wherever possible.

Students with long term conditions which affect their capacity to participate in particular sports will, wherever possible, be assigned to appropriate sports. Parents should advise the school in writing if their child is unable to participate in sport due to illness or injury.

Notes pertaining to PE lessons should be presented to the student's PE teacher at the commencement of the lesson. These are recorded and filed.

Attendance at Sports carnivals is compulsory. Students are encouraged to participate and wear House colours.

There are 3 seminar rooms which can be booked for small groups.

The library is also home to the Careers Adviser, the School Support Officer, the Reading recovery program, the Video conference centre, and meetings and events as they arise.

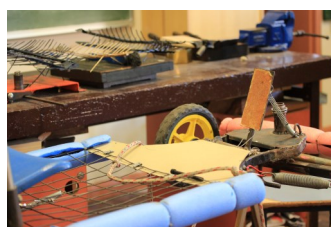

Years 11 and 12

Supervised study and space are provided to encourage effective use of study periods as students prepare for their HSC. Senior Prep is timetabled each week for every Year 11 and 12 student in D2. There they are given study, organization and motivation skills to assist them during HSC years.

Acceleration of Gifted & Talented Students

Where it has been deemed appropriate, students with an exceptional talent in a particular area have been accelerated and completed the HSC in that subject ahead of their normal year group. Taree High's timetable is flexible enough to accommodate these arrangements.

STUDENT PROGRESS

The Principal, Head Teachers, Year Advisers and staff welcome enquiries from parents regarding the progress of students. Interviews can be arranged by telephoning the school for a suitable time for an appointment.

ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING

The principal way in which Taree High School provides information about a student's achievement is by providing a semester report based on information gathered by the class teacher using tasks (e.g. tests and assessment tasks) that assess each student's level of achievement.

ASSESSMENT TASKS: (REFER ALSO TO THE SCHOOL ASSESSMENT CALENDAR/S)

Each course will nominate a number of assessment tasks which will ensure students have the opportunity to demonstrate their level of achievement of the course outcomes. Students will be informed of these tasks on the course outline issued by their class teacher.

Students are required to:

- complete each assessment task to the best of their ability
- submit these on or before the due date. Late submission of tasks incur penalties.

If unable to complete a task students must:

- provide the relevant class teacher with a satisfactory explanation if they are absent when a task is completed. Such an explanation will usually require the provision of documentary evidence such as a doctor's certificate or parental note.
- such explanations should be provided before the due date of the assessment task.
- complete the same task at the earliest possible date where this is appropriate OR
- attempt a similar task and, if this is also inappropriate, then an estimate based on other evidence will be used.

High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE)

Taree High School aims to educate all students to their potential and provide high quality educational outcomes for all students, including (HPGE). The school provides a framework that will identify, support, and develop the gifts and talents of all our students and enable all students to realize their potential abilities.

ACADEMIC INITIATIVES

A variety of procedures is adopted to identify students with gifts and talents and numerous programs are in place to cater for such students:

Many compulsory subjects (such as English, Mathematics and Science) provide extension classes for high achieving students with abilities in specific curriculum areas in Years 8-10.

Students with identified abilities in specific areas are invited to participate in focus days conducted by each subject area.

Taree High's curriculum structure provides great scope for specialisation and extension, particularly in Years 9 and 10. Courses are offered in 100 hour units. Units are offered in:

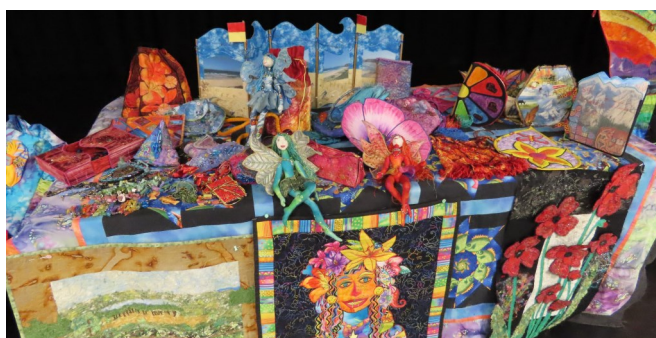

The Learning Support Team (LST) identifies students to assist them in their learning.

Determination of student needs identified through:

Other support is provided in class and on a withdrawal basis for individual students by the STLA.

External Testing /Assessment:

VALID—Science—Year 8 and Year 10 (online)

Literacy & Numeracy testing:

All students in Years 7 & 9 sit the NAPLAN test online. These are a national literacy & numeracy tests.

Results of the NAPLAN tests are provided to parents & the school. An analysis of the results, the planning of follow-up and the development of explicit strategies aimed at addressing identified areas of concern has commenced at Taree High School with a meeting of Taree High school staff and our NAPLAN Community of Schools

Support in sitting for exams & assessment tasks (“disability provisions”)

Students with diagnosed learning difficulties or physical impairments are eligible to receive exam & assessment support. This is coordinated by the LAST.

The **NESA** provides Special Provisions for students with learning difficulties at the Higher School Certificate examinations. Students need to apply and have
