Firstly, news on Peter Bird. Peter has been moved to Ryde Rehabilitation Hospital where he is undergoing intensive physiotherapy and rehabilitation. He is very talkative and making progress. Recently, I visited him with a giant card that had been constructed by a Year 8 Visual Arts class and signed by them and the SRC. They had drawn caricatures of Mr Bird and the card was a collage of these drawings. He was extremely moved by the gesture and chuckled at some of them....I thought they were quite appropriate depictions! He is very grateful for the well wishes still flowing from the school and community.

Many would be aware of the NSW government's decision to nominate Taree High School and Taree Public School as a Connected Community. The aim of this strategy is to establish a sustained, structured, interagency model of support for Aboriginal students and their families to improve educational and employment opportunities and increase cultural awareness of our local Biripi people. The strategy is a fantastic opportunity for communities to pool resources and work together in partnership. This is seen as an add-on and not a replacement model for the school. All other programs and curriculum will be as they are now. Taree High will continue to provide a robust and diverse curriculum, catering for all students' needs.

A number of highlights this month are outlined in the newsletter which are testimony to the continued strive for excellence in all fields. Whether academic, sporting or cultural, Taree High students excel at whatever they turn their hands to. The Hospitality students catered for the opening of the Trade Training Centre, entertaining dignitaries from the Federal Government Rob Oakshott and Matt Thistlethwaite; the Singas, Fellas and many of our bands won all sections of the Eisteddfod with 63 Taree High students performing in the Grand Concert; the senior

debaters made the regional finals; the Lawn Bowls team made the state finals; we won the Science & Engineering Challenge posting one of the highest scores in Australia-the team are now off to contest the national event; and so many others...

Accordingly, Year 11 students will then be called upon to make some decisions for their immediate future. At times these decisions will be flawed. I take this opportunity to analyse the decision making skills of young adolescents.

DEPUTY'S REPORT

As Year 10 begin to think about the choices they will make for their senior studies, it seems the right time to look at the changes that have been made to the Certificate which will be achieved by them at the end of 2012.

As you are all aware the School Certificate will no longer be issued to students on the completion of their Year 10 studies. Instead a Record of School Achievement will report student results.

External examinations will not be given during term 4. Instead the results reported on the Record of School Achievement will be provided by the school; they will be determined by the assessment tasks and examinations which are completed throughout the year at school. This means that it is essential that students give their best effort on all school assessments so that the highest possible grade can be recorded.

At the present time there are increasing numbers of Year 10 students who are not meeting the assessment requirements of the courses they are studying. These students are jeopardising their successful completion of their Stage 5 studies. Students who do not meet assessment requirements for a subject may still receive an 'N Award' for that subject and this may result in a student not achieving a Record of School Achievement. However, these students will be given a transcript of the subjects they have completed satisfactorily when they leave school. As they will not have met requirements for the completion of their Year 10 studies, they may not be able to progress to Year 11; they may need to repeat their Year 10 studies.

The record will be issued only to students who request it at the end of the year. For the majority of students it will be kept by the Board of Studies and their Preliminary and HSC results will be added to it. For students who leave school between the end of Year 10 and their HSC, the Record will be provided which lists the results achieved for each year of study completed from Years 10, 11 and 12.

Inside, we were addressed by a handful of state politicians, who gave us some insight into what life is like as a member of the State Legislative Assembly. This was very interesting, especially when the one of the members described the effect the job has on their personal lives. Not only does the position require a large investment of time to accommodate travelling all over the state, but it takes strength on the part of the MP's family, Sam Kellahan who are targeted from time to time when the politics start to get ugly. After the address, each member took the students of their own electorate on a tour of Parliament House. We were shown the rooms of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly (the state equivalents of the Senate and the House of Representatives). The 24th of May was the day that Year 10 of Taree High became even more aware of the impact garbage is having on the oceans of the world. We were all inspired!

The concept of 'Take 3' is simple; whenever you go to a beach or water way, collect three pieces of rubbish and help save the beaches and oceans of the world! It is a clean beach initiative which focuses on the concept of keeping and restoring our beaches clean and rubbish free and to try to save the marine life that our garbage is killing. Tim Silverwood presented the seminar. He told us of the numbers of animals that are killed every year because of rubbish. You don't want to know the statistics....over one million sea birds and over one hundred thousand mammals die every year as a result of rubbish in the oceans. Although this may seem like only a problem for the animals, it affects people as well. It is thought that 9% of all lantern fish living close to the North Pacific Gyre (which houses the world's largest garbage patch of manmade debris almost the size of Italy as a result of the tides circulating the region) show evidence of having ingested plastic. This means that not only the fish are suffering but us humans who will eventually be catching some of those fish and ingesting the plastic ourselves. No one wants to eat plastic, and we can empathise with the thousands of baby albatrosses that die each year as a result of being fed plastic instead of food by their confused mothers.

By the end of the seminar we were shown some easy tips to help out: always recycle! Try to purchase reusable products therefore reducing your rubbish output. Never leave rubbish behind, always bin it but most importantly "TAKE 3".

<u>TAFE/Taree High School Peer</u> Literacy Tutoring Program

The Peer Literacy Tutoring Program commenced in Week 7 of Term 1. This follows on from the very successful programs which ran in 2010 and 2011. The program is a collaboration between Taree TAFE and the school. Twenty-two Year 10 students have volunteered to be trained and to work as peer tutors for Year 7 students. The aim of the program is to assist the Year 7 students in their transition to high school by helping them improve their reading skills and to become more confident and independent learners. Many studies, both in Australia and overseas, report the

great benefits of cross-age and one-to-one tutoring which result in both academic and social gains for all students involved.

The Year 10 students attended two TAFE training days early in Term 1 where they learned skills and strategies to help younger students improve their reading and understanding of different class texts. In Week 7 they met their buddies and commenced working as peer tutors. They are supervised and assessed by TAFE Literacy teacher Kate Fazio. The school coordinators are Mrs Webber and Mrs Abbott. The program runs in the school library during roll call three mornings per week. The Year 10 students are provided with authentic text from class teachers which the Year 7s will be studying in the coming weeks. This gives an opportunity for the Year 7s to gain an understanding of the texts so that they will be ready to participate fully in future lessons in class. Skills at decoding unknown words and gaining meaning from the text are passed on from older student to younger student and the confidence of the younger student grows.

There are great benefits for the tutors as well as the Year 7 buddies: improving communication and thinking skills; learning new strategies on improving their own reading skills; building self esteem and confidence; revising subject matter; gaining enjoyment helping someone and making new friends. At the end of the program the Year 10 students will gain a **TAFE Certificate in Peer Literacy Tutoring.**

All students are making great progress in this course and it is an absolute delight to see them so involved and so committed to the program. Smiles all round!

The National Year of Reading is in full swing with events and activities both at school and in the wider community. Reading is at the heart of learning. Students often tell us that it's boring and they don't like doing it but no matter what our skill level we all read ... even if its simply scanning our environment and taking in visual cues. Its hard to dismiss a skill that can improve and enrich our lives so much:

What Reading can do for you

- 1. Enhanced Smarts
- 2. Reading reduces stress
- 3. Greater tranquillity
- 4. Improved analytical thinking
- 5. Increased vocabulary
- 6. Improved memory
- 7. Improved writing skills
- 8. Helps prioritize goals

How to read better

In the modern age of information, reading truly is a

fundamental survival skill. Here are ten tips that anyone can use to improve their reading skills:

1. You don't have to be a great reader to get the point. Some people read fast and remember everything. Others read slowly and take a couple of times to get all the information. It doesn't matter, really, so long as when you read, you get the information you're seeking.

2. Know WHY you're reading. Are you reading for entertainment or to learn something? Decide why you're reading before you start and you'll greatly improve your comprehension and your enjoyment.

3. You don't need to read everything. Not every magazine, letter, and email you receive contains information you need. In fact, most of it is simply junk. Throw it away, hit the delete key! Just doing this will double the amount of time you have available to read.

4. You don't need to read all of what you DO read. Be choosy: select the chapters and articles that are important. Ignore the rest.

5. Scan before you read. Look at the table of contents, index, topic headers, photo captions, etc. These will help you determine if, a) you have a real interest in this reading, and b) what information you're likely to get from it.

6. Prioritize your reading. You can't read everything all at once (and wouldn't want to). If it's important, read it now. If it's not, let it wait.

7. Optimize your reading environment. You'll read faster and comprehend more if you read in an environment that's comfortable for you.

8. Once you start, don't stop! Read each item straight through. If you finish and have questions, go back and re-read the pertinent sections. If you don't have questions, you got what you needed and are ready to move on.

9. Focus. Remember, you're reading with a purpose, so focus on that purpose and the material. If you lose interest or keep losing your place, take a break or read something else. You can keep track of where you are by following along with your hand. This simple technique helps you focus and increase your concentration.

10. Practice! The more you read, the better reader you'll become (and smarter, too)! So, feed your mind: read!
