DISABILITY PROVISIONS FOR HSC NEWSLETTER REPORT - TAREE HIGH SCHOOL

Help for students sitting the HSC Exams

Disability Provisions [formerly Special Examination Provisions] are arrangements that make it possible for students with permanent or temporary disabilities to fairly participate in the HSC examinations. 'Disability' in this context involves a physical, sensory, intellectual, mental health or learning issue/s that prevents a student participating 'on the same basis' as other students. Issues may include diabetes, vision difficulties, anxiety conditions, dyslexia or difficulties with handwriting

'Reasonable adjustments' may include special furniture or lighting, coloured paper, a reader, a writer, separate supervision and extra time. Applications are made to the Board of Studies with evidence gathered in the form of medical and therapist reports and reading and writing tests. Reading and writing tests are administered in school time. There is no guarantee that the BOS will grant Disability provisions.

Submissions are best submitted as early as possible.

Students who become ill or injured during the HSC exam period may be eligible to make an illness/misadventure appeal.

Gabbie: Did you enjoy that?


Mr Reece: Fantastic! Yeah it was good. It was lovely outside. It was really good, especially that COLA with the soundproofing in the roof.

OUT OF UNIFORM DAY

On Friday March 14 we held our first Out of Uniform day for 2014 – and it was a great success! We have raised a total of \$688.80 for the Humane Society International (HSI).

The HSI work closely with the United Nation, international governments and with various other organisations to find practical, culturally sensitive, and long-term solutions to common environmental and animal problems.

In particular, the Australian arm of HSI has a particular emphasis on:

- Creating and implementing policies to protect habitats critical to the survival of our native species
- Climate change and the protection of areas of high biodiversity (including our rainforests)
- The 'Humane Choice' food label to improve the lives of farm animals and address the unsustainable practice of intensive farming;
- Disaster relief support in developing countries to rescue stricken and abandoned animals
- National and international marine campaigns against whaling, and seeking greater protection for sharks, turtles, albatrosses and threatened fish species.

The SRC are proud to be raising funds for such a worthwhile cause – thanks again to everyone who supported our OOU day!

PBL AT THS

This term students at Taree High School have engaged with the new behavioural support model, Positive Behaviour for Learning, or PBL. The model allows for students who 'do the right thing' to be recognised for their persistent excellence in behaviour. The model has three key components:

1. Students are explicitly taught behaviour expectations associated with different areas and activities around the school; in short, 15 minute lessons.
2. Students are rewarded with a raffle ticket when they are observed doing the right thing around the school.
3. Through the introduction of the new assembly model, which seats students according to their house groups and coloured writsbands, students are encouraged to support each other across year groups. There are also 'surprise' activities at assembly, where students work as a team to earn their houses bonus points towards their totals.

The winner of the raffle is drawn weekly on our Tuesday morning assembly, with the lucky student drawn receiving their choice from the prize pool located outside the office at A15. Prizes on offer include a range of stationary items kindly donated by Officeworks Taree, as well as vouchers for Saltwater Wine, iTunes and EB Games and 'Pizza for you and your mates' tokens.

Raffle tickets also contribute points to the students' house totals and towards the merit system, where students can receive a Bronze, Silver or Gold level, based on their individual totals. The winning house group with the highest total point score at the end of the year will receive the PBL shield at Presentation Night.



PEER LITERACY PROGRAM

Aims:

- To enable Yr 7 students to access better written texts from all subject areas
- To provide Yr 10 students with TaFE accredited skills in tutoring.
- To facilitate proven successful outcomes of cross age tutoring.

This looks like:

Yr 7 students will be allocated to a Yr 10 tutor. Tutors and students will work with written texts from all subject areas. Support can be given for assignment and exam study. They will attend a special roll call in the library on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays.
