





THE WAKALI PROGRAM

The Wakali program has been formally introduced at Taree High School this term. Wakali (meaning "RISE UP" in the local Gathang language) is an Aboriginal leadership program developed by Mr Benn Saunders (Teacher, Aboriginal Language and Culture). Wakali has a fundamental focus on developing strong leadership qualities whilst connecting to country. Achieving this, a small group of students are invited each term to participate in Wakali and will experience guided cultural tours of a different significant site each fortnight by Uncle Russell Saunders (Elder), Mr Benn Saunders (Teacher) and Joshua Wood (SLSO). During each visit, workshops on a variety of topics are facilitated to encourage student leadership amongst the participants. The first session commenced on Monday February 11 with a guided cultural tour out to Forster where students acknowledged the beautiful Worimi country, identified a variety of local bush tucker, learnt a variety of local stories and incorporated the Gathang language into a variety of leadership activities.

SRC AND WORLD GREATEST SHAVE REPORT



We are now also easily recognisable with the arrival of our new SRC shirts and are wearing them proudly!





CREATIVE & PERFORMING ARTS (CAPA) REPORT

Welcome back everyone and, in particular, a warm welcome to our up-and-coming creative and performing artists. The CAPA staff cannot wait to work with you over a variety of projects and events this year. The main attraction, our MADD concert will display a range of student talent later in the year. This and much, much more in the way of Drama, Music, Visual Arts, Photography and Dance will be taking place in 2019 so stay tuned for all the action.

Drama

For the first time ever, our school is offering Year 7 students the opportunity to participate in Drama learning activities as part of the newly formed Learning Pods. Students are reading Wellbeing stories by Keith Heggart (Growing Great Schools Worldwide) whose "main purpose is education for wellbeing – to build healthy relationships, resilience and social and emotional development"

Our senior students recently visited the Seymour Centre, Sydney, to view "OnStage" This event displays exemplary works from the 2018 HSC across the range of projects.

Both the Year 9 and Year 10 Drama and Theatresports students had the opportunity to travel to Port Macquarie in early March to attend a performance of "Lucky Country" by Zeal Theatre. Students will also participate in a physical theatre workshop to expand their repertoire of movement skills.

Already, some of our Creative Arts students have visited the Manning Regional Art Gallery to view the JADA (Jacaranda Acquisitive Drawing Award) exhibition, which promotes excellence in contemporary Australian drawing.

The 9/10 2D Visual Arts class are studying the iconic Vincent Van Gogh paintings, particularly "Starry Night", which they will be appropriating in an acrylic painting.

The Year 9/10 Ceramic elective class are producing some technically strong amphoras (pots) which they will glaze and fire before the end of Term One.


The Year 9/10 Photographic and Digital Media class have been putting their learned photographic techniques into practise along the Manning River and are making steady progress towards their portfolios.




CONGRATULATIONS JESSICA WALLACE!

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses interacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (apelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The assessment provides parents and achools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace origoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What is assessed?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular echool curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

in 2019 most students across Australia will ait NAPLAN online.

Feedback in the first year of NAPLAN Online showed that students engaged well with online assessments. One of the main benefits of NAPLAN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test automatically adapte to a student's test performance. The test presents questions of higher or lower complexity, depending on a student's performance.

Taikred (or adaptive) teeting is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer conectly. NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type — just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will complete the writing test on paper.

How can I help my child prepare?

Help your child prepare by reseauring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply by their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs are a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at acheol.

ACARA does not recommend exceesive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of coaching providers. NAPLAN is about assessing learning progress in literacy and numeracy.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

In 2019, your child will sit the NAPLAN online tests. However, children in some other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN paper tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that all schools will move online by 2020. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are assessed on the same literacy and numeracy curriculum content, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats can be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale. To find out more about NAPLAN Online, visit nap.edu.au

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN sessement.

Studente with disability may qualify for adjustmenta that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. You should first discuss the use of any disability adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A formal ecomption may be granted for a student with disability that severally limits their capacity to participate in the accessment, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on NAPLAN Online disability adjustments or the process required to gain a formal ecomption.

NAPLAN Online 2019 timetable

The accelerate window for NAPLAN Online is extended from three days provided for the paper test to nine days. This is to give achools more flexibility in scheduling and accommodate schools that may have fewer devices. The NAPLAN Online accelerater window starts on Tuesday 14 May and finishes on Friday 24 May 2019.

NAP ASSESSMENT

What if my child is absent from school on assessment days?

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Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule. Individual students are not permitted to sit NAPLAN online tests after Friday 24 May 2019.

How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student parkmance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's achool later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's achool.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parente may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachera use results to better identify students who would benefit from granter challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and scase to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systeme use results to review programs and support offered to schools.

Unacceptable behaviour may include but is not limited to:


- Aggressive or intimidating actions, such as violence, threatening gestures or physical proximity.


