You will be aware that Taree High School provides opportunities for students to study subjects with practical components that often require the use of special equipment and materials. Introducing our new Attendance Officer at Taree High School, Jenny Umbers



Jenny's new position involves liaising with parents/carers and the HSLO/ASLO to develop Attendance Plans for identified students, with the aim to improve regular attendance. Jenny will analyse attendance data to identify at-risk students and tracking patterns of attendance. From this information, Jenny will work with parents/carers and students in developing Attendance Plans to re-engage students to attend school every day. The effect of this strategy, will see improved educational outcomes for students, giving greater opportunities as they transition the school to work, training or further education.

To support you in achieving this:

We will maintain our channels of communication with parents and caregivers. You can assist us in this through ensuring **your contact details** are up to date and your phone can receive SMS from the school. Some students have successfully in the past blocked the number on their parents' phones.

We will advise you by SMS of daily and class absences; send letters after 3 days absence with Jenny Umbers, our Attendance Officer contacting parents when there is an attendance concern.



TERM 3 FOCUS

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
Attendance is a focus of the Taree High School Strategic Improvement Plan. Targets of over 90% school attendance are the ideal as students are maximising their learning opportunities.


Students who achieve this were congratulated at the recent Year Presentation Assemblies with over 300 students rewarded for their excellent attendance overall.

Our focus for Term 3 is eliminating Fractional Truancy. This will include students who truant classes and also students who are consistently late to school without a valid reason.

The majority of Taree High school students attend all classes timetabled without any fuss. From next term, students who truant classes during the day will be required to make the time up and complete missed work with their class teachers. Students who defy this, will be withdrawn from the playground at recess and lunch to complete their work and be placed on a Blue Attendance Monitoring Card. Further defiance will see a suspension issued for Persistent Disobedience.

We encourage parents to discuss this with their children and support the school in this area of concern. Students will be taken through the new procedures on return to school Term 3.





ENGLISH

Media for Millennials: Podcast Workshop

In Week 5 we were lucky enough to be visited by journalist Stephanie Aceglav who is also the host of a podcast called "What You Didn't Know". Stephanie tours schools in NSW conducting a workshop which teaches students everything they need to know about starting their own podcast - from coming up with a topic and title, writing intros and outros, recording, editing, adding music, and where and how to upload their podcast for the general public to listen.

The session began in the morning with students brainstorming what they are passionate about and what they could potentially talk about for an extended period of time. They also had to decide what style they wanted it to be: an interview, a commentary, a monologue - most of the THS students decided they wanted to 'rant'.

We had a range of great topics covered:

'Dumb Movie Things' was about the flaws and plot holes in films - including why there was plenty of room for Rose to let Jack float on the door in Titanic, and how unbelievable it is for one woman to have 27 close friends she would be bridesmaids for!

3Musketeens discussed all of the issues facing teens today: annoying parents, learning to drive (with annoying parents in the car), and the many different types of relationships they have in their lives today - with friends, partners, employers, and teachers (and annoying parents) - and how they manage these.


Kate and Sam attempted to settle the age-old debate: who is better - boys or girls - except the twist was Kate arguing for the boys while Sam was for the girls.

We also heard episodes which argued why Dumbledore is the villain of Harry Potter; and one group discussed which is better - books or films.

The students used authentic podcast equipment - condenser microphones to record and Audacity to edit and add sounds effects - which made these podcasts sound amazing It was a wonderful experience for the students and we will hopefully be able to invite Stephanie back for more workshops in the future.







LIBRARY

The highlight of the term so far has been the visit of a famous illustrator to our library. Mr Marc McBride is an Irishman who did all the illustrations for the Deltora Quest series by Emily Rodda. He is an expert in drawing dragons, monsters and weird creatures of all kinds. On May 21 he entertained us with his witty stories and demonstration of the air brushing technique he uses for his art. The students were all mesmerized by his flamboyant style and lyrical accent.

Many of our students are avid drawers – Murribi Lester, Shantel Parsons and Caleb De Vries for example, and Mr McBride inspired them to keep working on their art – "if I can do it, so can you" he said. We may even enter a few artworks in the competition which he recommended to us at ozkids.com.au. The best thing of all was that we got to keep the dragon that he created for us. I have had it framed and it is in pride of place in the library.

A shout out once more to each of our dancers. We look forward to seeing the glitzy routine at other showcases throughout the year.




Ceramics Incursion

Musical Instruments




Futsul

Game 1 Taree High School v Camden Haven High School



Touch Football



Touch Football continued


Also in Week 7 both our 9/10 Boys & Girls teams competed in the NSW Touch Football All Schools Carnival at Port Macquarie.




The boys played Tomaree High School and the weather conditions improved slightly and also came away with a 8-2 win.

Athletics 2021



For safety and wellbeing of students who attend this program, students are not permitted to leave the school premises before the Homework centre begins without parental permission.


