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Word from Principal

In 2021 we saw many disruptions to schools across NSW. I would like to thank parents/carers, students and staff for their adaptability to the rapid changes as they occurred. We welcomed new staff and at the end of the year farewelled staff.

I would like to thank all the staff and students for their implementation and cooperative approach to the introduction of the new phone policy this year. 87% of students complied immediately and I congratulate them for that. Some of the positive comments from students included feeling their classrooms were more settled; more learning was taking place and the teacher did not have to have arguments with students. Some comments from staff included their observations of more attentive students in classrooms; less confrontation with students and less students using their phones in the playground at recess or lunch. Subjects where the needed to use the phones for Apps such as Chemistry, Photography did so with compliance by students to only use their phones for the activity prescribed by the teacher. The success of the cooperation led to the policy being extended through until the end of 2021 and will continue in 2022.

For the first half of the year there were many successes by a variety of sporting teams and individual athletes. Our thanks go to staff who coach, students who represented with such great respect for their opponents, and parents who assisted with transport. On a cultural note our Aboriginal Dance Groups were busy performing at a variety of community events and supporting other schools including preschools. Their sharing of Biripi language and culture led by Uncle Russ, Benn Saunders, Tannika Lewis, Mikah Gibson and Josh Wood is extremely valued. Year 7 also had an "On Country" excursion to Saltwater where they took part in workshops to reinforce what they had been learning in class this term.

There was great news for the school in the area of a technology upgrade through the Rural Access Gap Strategy. All of our ageing smartboards are to be replaced, as well as additional laptops for students and staff to ensure equity of access to technology across the school. We look forward to the installation and use in 2022.

Year 12 students once again were disrupted by the pandemic with the school in Lockdown for 4 weeks in Term 3. Not to be deterred they engaged in online learning and returned to school in Week 10 and then again for 3 weeks in Term 4. They were well supported by teaching staff and the Senior Prep Team to not only complete tasks but to prepare for post school through individual interviews with our amazing Careers Adviser, Glen Bowman.

Another schoolwide focus began in Term 3 with the engagement of an Attendance Officer. Mrs Umbers worked with families and students to raise the attendance rates of individual students to ensure their access to education would lead to improved learning outcomes. There were some very positive results. This will continue into 2022.

I would like to congratulate all students for their resilience over 2021 and also acknowledge those who through diligence received Awards at Semester and End of Year presentations.

I would also like to thank parents for your ongoing support of the school throughout another disrupted year.

I wish everyone a wonderful, restful and safe break over summer and look forward to a bright new year in 2022.

ATTENDANCE

During Term 3, the Taree High School attendance focus was to encourage students whose attendance was between 80 – 90% to improve by at least 5% by the end of term. Students who attend more regularly achieve more learning, more socialising and more growth in their lives than those who do not. Students who achieve their goal were to be rewarded with a special lunch.

Most students involved in these small focus groups improved their attendance. Not all achieved their goal, however, all improvement deserves a reward.

Due to school closures and other COVID related issues, we were unable to reward successful students with the lunch. Instead, every student with improved attendance involved in these focus groups will receive a movie voucher to Fay's Twin Cinemas. These rewards will be distributed before the end of the term.

The end-of-year trip for those students reaching an attendance rate of 95% and above has not been able to proceed due to COVID restrictions.

We look forward to a positive start to the 2022 year with all Taree High students attending every class, every day.
