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#### **Principal's Report**

With half of the year gone and the final term for Year 12 looming, I reflect on what has happened this term.

COVID and now Influenza A&B have had a major impact on attendance with numbers of positive COVID cases decreasing and Influenza cases rising in the school in staff and students. I would like to thank parents for having students vaccinated, alerting the school to positive cases and keeping unwell students at home. The impact on staff has also been great with a shortage of casual teachers to replace them. On average eight staff are absent per day either with COVID / Influenza or caring for children with COVID/ Influenza. I would like to thank the staff for taking multiple extra classes over the term to prevent students sitting in the playground due to teacher absence. To date this has never occurred at Taree High School and it is due to the dedication of our staff and their willingness to go above and beyond their teaching loads. We are seeking more staff to be able to fill the gaps available.

One recruitment, dear to our hearts and minds was seeking a replacement for our Senior Leader Community Engagement, Jay Davis who passed away last December. The skill set Jay possessed was rare and covered such a broad range of expertise. He is still with us every day and his footprint on Taree High School is very evident. After advertising the position, Tannika Lewis was successful and will take on the role from Third Term.

Agriculture is taking off again after the arrival of Sienna Anderson (Hawkins) at the beginning of the year. Students have participated in Wingham Beef Week for the first time in a number of years and are looking for further opportunities to develop their skills. A new tractor has also been purchased for the Ag Farm.

One alarming issue we are faced with at the moment is Vaping. Parents are encouraged to discuss this highly addictive and health damaging activity with their children. Police talks have highlighted this with Year 7&8 and will have the same talk with Years 9&10 in Third Term. School consequences include some students being suspended for use in the toilets or in the bus zones. It is illegal for people under 18 to buy Vapes and we will provide any information to police regarding the supply of Vapes to our students.

We have received notification that the school has finally been accepted into the Cooler Classrooms program (air conditioning for all learning spaces). It is mooted that the works may begin later this year. Maybe in time for summer?? Watch this space!! We have however installed large bladed fans in classrooms as an interim measure for summer.

This term also saw the installation of new Interactive Display Boards (52 in total) for every learning space under the Rural Access Gap Program. This was a very welcome upgrade of our technology.

At the end of Term 2 we say goodbye to 3 longstanding SASS members. Rhonda Tuckwell (front office); Rhonda King (printroom) and Jeni Hofmeier (library). They truly have been an asset to the school, we thank them for their service and we will miss them all very much. They have served the school for a combined total of 75 years. We wish them all the very best in their retirement.

I hope you have a pleasant break over the holidays. School resumes for students on the 19th July on a Week B timetable.

## **Compulsory school attendance**

### I Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier

and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

#### What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

#### The Importance of arriving on time

• Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day

Helps students learn the importance of punctuality
and routine

- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

#### What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

#### **NSW Department of Education**

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

#### Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

#### My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

## What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

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• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

#### What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

#### Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school. We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.




# Sorry Day and Reconciliation Day

Murribi Lester spoke about the history behind why we celebrate Reconciliation Week and Sorry Day in front of the whole school.

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












### Library Report

### CAPA - Visual Arts




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### Science RYSTEM Challenge


