

Exciting News! Taree High School is proud to unveil our new Mobile Device Policy, "Off and Away."

We've worked tirelessly with our incredible learners, dedicated staff, and Parent and Community (P&C) representatives to bring you this policy, designed to enhance our learning environment.

Concerned about your child's mobile phone access? Don't worry! We've emailed caregivers today an exemption application for special needs cases, whether it's medical or unique learning requirements. Each application will be carefully reviewed, taking your child's unique circumstances into account. Have questions or want to chat about it? We're here for you! Reach out anytime. Your unwavering support means the world to us as we join forces to create a nurturing and focused learning environment for all our learners.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR TAREE HIGH SCHOOL REPESENTATION

To be eligible for school representation, Taree High School students must meet the following criteria:

Have attempted all assessment work due for completion and submitted it to the relevant teacher on time.

 Maintain a satisfactory standard of attendance of 80% or above, including punctuality and attending all lessons.

• Consistently demonstrate the school's core values of Cooperation, Participation, and Respect by maintaining a positive behaviour standard.

Ineligibility Criteria:

Students are ineligible if: • Assignment/assessment is incomplete or not submitted by due date without reasonable explanation or a warning letter has been issued, without a satisfactory redemption.

Attendance is less than 80%

• 5 unexplained lates or truancy recorded in the past 5 weeks

• Behaviour is unsatisfactory and is under review (placed on a Yellow Level).

• Received a formal caution to suspend in the previous 3 weeks OR they've resolved a suspension in the previous 5 weeks.

• Banned from non-compulsory excursions for 10 or more uniform infringements in the previous 10 weeks.

Finalising Student Lists

 Excursion Coordinators should email the teaching staff a list of potential students and seek feedback on the ineligibility criteria before organisation is complete.
Students cannot be considered for

representation and should not receive permission notes while they are considered ineligible.

• Excursion/Team lists must be finalised and be included with the blue Excursion Form no later than 2 days prior to the event.

Appeals/Special Circumstances

A student can enter a written submission no later than 1 week prior to the event to the Senior Executive or Head Teacher for consideration of special circumstances. This submission will be considered, and the findings communicated to the student and organiser of the event.






TECHNOLOGY & APPLIED STUDIES (TAS) NEWS CONT,
