Mobile Device Policy

Purpose

This procedure guides student use of digital devices and online services at our school.

While mobile phones and other devices have significant advantages for use in the broader community, their use in schools can be highly problematic. In schools, mobile electronic devices can be significant distractors to learning and they can also pose significant risk to the safety of students through unfiltered access to the internet and by giving students the easy means through which they can contact those outside the school community who can pose a threat to those within.

Our school acknowledges the educational value of digital devices and online services in supporting and enhancing educational outcomes and student wellbeing. We also recognise they may cause harm if used inappropriately and that we need to support our students to use them in safe, responsible, and respectful ways.

Scope

This procedure provides a consistent framework for the safe, responsible, and respectful use of digital devices and online services by students in our school. It sets out the shared responsibilities of school staff, students, as well as parents and carers. It also provides a framework to manage potential risks to student safety and wellbeing.

This procedure covers student use of digital devices and online services in school-related settings, including on school grounds, at school-related activities and outside of school where there is a clear and close connection between the school and the conduct of students. This procedure covers the use of school-provided and personal digital devices and all online services.

Our School's Approach

At Taree High School we acknowledge that students may need to be in possession of an electronic device, especially a mobile phone, for reasons relating to their safety in travelling to and from school.

We understand there may be occasions during school that electronic devices may be used for lesson delivery and educational engagement. A decision to use an electronic device will be under the explicit direction and supervision of the classroom teacher.

Students may not use mobile phones or similar devices while on school grounds without the direct permission of a teacher. This will mean that students will have a responsibility to turn off their phone and store it safely in their school bag for the course of the school day. This is an approved NSW Department of Education option and will limit unnecessary distractions and complement our ongoing approach to ensure every student maximises their learning and social growth in a safe and supportive environment.

If parents choose to allow their child to bring a mobile phone or similar device to school, school staff are not to see or hear the device at any time and students are not to use the device at any

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teacher's name on it. Parent/carer will be contacted, and the device may be collected from the front office at the end of the day by a parent or carer. Student will attend 1 x detention.

 2^{nd} Instance - Students who choose to use their mobile devices for any purpose for a 2^{nd} time within a calendar year without permission or direction from teaching staff will have the device confiscated and placed in an envelope in the safe in the front office with the student's name, date, time and teacher on it and parent/carer will be notified. The device may be collected from the front office at the end of the day by a parent or carer. Student will attend 5 x detentions (1 week). A turquoise card will be in effect to monitor detention attendances.

3rd Instance - Students who choose to use their mobile device for any purpose a 3rd time within a calendar year without permission or direction from teaching staff will be suspended for continued disobedience consistent with Taree High School and NSW Department of Education Policy. The device will be confiscated and placed in an envelope in the safe in the front office with the student's name, date, time and teacher on it, parent/carer will be notified, and a formal caution will be issued.

4th Instance - Students who choose to use their mobile device for any purpose a 4th time within a calendar year without permission or direction from teaching staff will be suspended for continued disobedience consistent with Taree High School and NSW Department of Education Policy. The device will be confiscated and placed in an envelope in the safe in the front office with the student's name, date, time and teacher on it, parent/carer will be notified, and a formal suspension will be issued.

In the event a student refuses to hand over their personal electronic device when requested, a formal caution will be issued, and parent/carer will be notified.

<u>Contact between Students and Parents or Carers</u> During the School Day

Students should not use the device to contact a parent/caregiver during school hours. If a student needs to make an urgent call during the school day, they must request this from a teacher. All such calls or messages should be made only through the school's administration office.

Parents are asked not to ring or message their child during the day and should be aware that calls or messages to their child will not be accessed until the end of the school day. It is an expectation of Taree High School that parents support this Mobile Device Policy to enable their child to get the maximum benefit from class time.

Responsibilities and Obligations

Supporting students to use digital devices and online services in safe, responsible, and respectful ways is a shared responsibility.

For students

- Keep all Mobile Devices switched off and in school bags. Do not store in pockets or on your person.
- Be safe, responsible, and respectful users of digital devices and online services and support their peers to be the same.
- Respect and follow school rules and procedures and the decisions made by staff, knowing that
 other schools may have different arrangements.
- Communicate respectfully and collaboratively with peers, school staff and the school community and behave in the ways described in the Behaviour Code for Students.





For parents and carers

- Recognise the role they play in educating their children and modelling the behaviours that underpin the safe, responsible, and respectful use of digital devices and online services.
- · Support implementation of the school procedure, including its approach to resolving issues.
- Take responsibility for their child's use of digital devices and online services at home such as
 use of online services with age and content restrictions.
- · Communicate with school staff and the school community respectfully and collaboratively.
- Switch off or put their digital devices on silent when at official school functions, during meetings and when assisting in the classroom.

For the principal and teachers

- Deliver learning experiences that encourage safe, responsible, and respectful use of digital devices and online services. This includes:
 - Establishing agreed classroom expectations for using digital devices and online services, in line with this procedure and Departmental policy.
 - Identifying strategies to ensure that all students can engage in classroom activities including strategies to accommodate students without a digital device.
 - Reading and abiding by the Terms of Service for any online services they use in teaching, including those limiting use by age.
 - Educating students about online privacy, intellectual property, copyright, digital literacy, and other online safety related issues.
- Model appropriate use of digital devices and online services in line with Departmental policy.
- Respond to and report any breaches and incidents of inappropriate use of digital devices and online services as required by school procedures, Departmental policy, and any statutory and regulatory requirements. This includes:
 - Reporting the creation, possession, or distribution of indecent or offensive material to the Incident Support and Report hotline as required by the Incident Notification and Response Policy and Procedures and consider any mandatory reporting requirements.
 - Working with the Department and the Office of the ESafety Commissioner (if necessary) to resolve cases of serious online bullying and image-based abuse.
 - Following the school's Behaviour Management Plan when responding to any incident of inappropriate student behaviour relating to the use of digital devices or online services.
- If feasible and particularly as issues emerge, support parents and carers to understand strategies that promote their children's safe, responsible, and respectful use of digital devices and online services.
- Participate in Professional Development related to appropriate use of digital devices and online services.

For non-teaching staff, volunteers, and contractors

- Be aware of the Department's policy, this procedure and act in line with the conduct described.
- Report any inappropriate use of digital devices and online services to the Principal, school Executive or school staff they are working with.

Communicating this Procedure to the School Community

Taree High School will enforce positive student behaviour standards through consistent processes that support the maintenance of a positive school culture and clearly articulate school-wide expectations.

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Students will be informed about this policy through whole school assemblies as well as year meetings throughout the duration of the school year. Signage reminding students of their obligations surrounding portable electronic devices will be displayed throughout the school.

Parents and carers will be advised of our Mobile Device Policy via the school newsletter. This policy can be accessed electronically via the school's website and in hardcopy at the school's administration office.

All newly enrolling students and parents/carers will be required to read and acknowledge the school's Mobile Device Policy prior to commencing education at Taree High School.

Confidentiality and Privacy

All personal information collected regarding student behaviour issues and reports on incidents will be kept securely and in the strictest of confidences, and access will only be available to authorised persons.

Definitions

A Mobile Device includes, but is not limited to, electronic devices that can receive, store, process and share digital information and connect to applications (apps), websites and other online

services. They include desktop computers, laptops, tablets, smartwatches, smartphones, earbuds/airpods and other devices.

Review

The school's Mobile Device Policy has been developed in consultation with staff, students, and the school's parent community. The Principal or delegated staff member will review this procedure annually.





Mathematics News

A number of Year 8 classes have been selected to take part in the FIELD Trial of the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS). TIMSS is an important educational research project investigating student achievement in mathematics and science. More than 60 countries, including Australia, are participating in this study. TIMSS is an important activity to keep us, as parents and citizens, informed about how our students in Australia are performing in comparison to their peers in other countries and to compare programs of study and teaching practices. We will be able to obtain current national and international information which will help improve the teaching and learning of mathematics and science in our country.

Selected students will do an assessment in mathematics and science and complete a questionnaire about their experiences at home and school. There is no need for students to study specifically for the assessment as it will not affect individual students' grades or progress in school.

All data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual student or school will be identified in published data or reports.

Please Note: ACET will also be providing brochures to be sent home with students which includes more details about the assessment and also the privacy statement. These brochures will be provided about 2 weeks before the assessment period. We will also provided an electronic version of the brochure, which could be distributed via your schools online communication system, if preferred.

Science - Year 8 VALID Text

The Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development (VALID) test for Year 8 students will be held in Term 4 between Monday 23 October and Friday 3 November 2023 (weeks 3 and 4). The test takes approximately 75 minutes and will be completed in class on computers. Your child will be given a copy of the following letter to bring home before the end of this term.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR TAREE HIGH SCHOOL REPRESENTATION

To be eligible for school representation, Taree High School students must meet the following criteria:

- Have attempted all assessment work due for completion and submitted it to the relevant teacher on time.
- Maintain a satisfactory standard of attendance of 80% or above, including punctuality and attending all lessons.
- Consistently demonstrate the school's core values of Cooperation, Participation, and Respect by maintaining a positive behaviour standard.

Ineligibility Criteria:

Students are ineligible if:

- Assignment/assessment is incomplete or not submitted by due date without reasonable explanation or a warning letter has been issued, without a satisfactory redemption.
- Attendance is less than 80%
- 5 unexplained lates or truancy recorded in the past 5 weeks
- . Behaviour is unsatisfactory and is under review (placed on a Yellow Level).
- Received a formal caution to suspend in the previous 3 weeks OR they've resolved a suspension in the previous 5 weeks.
- Banned from non-compulsory excursions for 10 or more uniform infringements in the previous 10 weeks.

Finalising Student Lists

- Excursion Coordinators should email the teaching staff a list of potential students and seek feedback on the ineligibility criteria before organisation is complete.
- Students cannot be considered for representation and should not receive permission notes while they are considered ineligible.
- Excursion/Team lists must be finalised and be included with the blue Excursion Form no later than 2 days prior to the event.

Appeals/Special Circumstances

A student can enter a written submission no later than 1 week prior to the event to the Senior Executive or Head Teacher for consideration of special circumstances. This submission will be considered, and the findings communicated to the student and organiser of the event.


Figure 7 Playing Blooket at the Science Fair

Technology and Applied Studies (TAS) Report

Term 3 Junior TAS Activities

I am please to provide an update on the exciting and productive activities undertaken by our junior TAS (Technology and Applied Studies) students in term 3. Our students have been actively engaged in a wide range of projects that have allowed them to develop their skills, creativity and understanding of various aspects of technology and applied studies.

Year 7 Quest - Fashion Art: In this quest, our Year 7 students have been immersed in the world of fashion art. They have learned basic sewing techniques and surface decoration methods, which has culminated in the creation of tie-dyed and appliqué caravan tote bags. Additionally, they are preparing to print photos on fabric to craft "All About Me" cushions, employing a variety of textile art techniques. This project encourages self-expression artistic exploration.

Year 7 Quest - Taree Kitchen Rules: The Year 7 students in this quest have been delving into the versatile uses of staple food products and exploring how to cook and utilise them on a budget in the home. Staple ingredients like rice, egg, cheese, pasta, and vegetables have been the focus on their investigations. This hands-on approach to cooking and budgeting equips them with essential life skills that can be applied both at home and in professional culinary settings.

Year 7 Technology Mandatory: Our Year 7 students participating in the Technology Mandatory program have been involved in diverse activities. They have been crafting tie-dye pencil cases in the Textile module, learning about sustainability through self-watering planters in the Grow to Eat program, and experimenting with cooking various dishes that incorporate the "paddock to plate" concept. The experiences emphasise practical skills and sustainability awareness.

Digital Technology: In the realm of digital technology, students are actively engaging in coding their own interactive games, annotating comic strips, and delving into the societal implications of technology. These activities not only foster computational thinking but also encourage critical thinking the role of technology in our lives.

Year 8 Elective - Food Technology: Our Year 8 students in Food Technology have been conducting research and creating dishes from around the world. They will be assessed on their chosen cultural food, promoting an appreciation of global cuisines and culinary traditions.

Year 8 Technology Mandatory - Textiles: In the textiles module, our Year 8 students have been enthusiastically engaged in crafting imaginative monsters. Utilising recycled fabric, they have embraced sustainability while giving life to their creative visions. This project not only fosters artistic expression but also encourages an eco-conscious approach to design. Furthermore, students have had the opportunity to explore the world of Aboriginal designers, gaining insights into the rich culture heritage and artistic tradition of Indigenous communities.

Year 8 Technology Mandatory - Food: In the Food Technology module, our students have left lasting impressions with their culinary prowess. Their standout achievement has been the creation of delectable dumplings, demonstrating their culinary skills and creativity in the kitchen. Beyond this, students have been tasked with conceiving and preparing their own healthy lunchbox meals. This project promotes both culinary innovation and nutritional awareness, equipping students with practical knowledge for making balanced meal choices.

Year 8 Technology Mandatory - Engineering: Students have explored the principle of flight by constructing and flying various types of planes, from aeroplanes to wide-winged cardboard models. They've also had the opportunity to fold and throw paper boomerangs, while learning about Aboriginal engineering and the use of tools and weapons. Furthermore, students have designed and tested rubber band-powered cars and catapults, making learning hands on and fun.
















Wellbeing Team

The other group watched a demonstration of a car being dismantled as it would in a rescue situation. Year 11 displayed a lot of respect to our guests and enjoyed all of the presentations which have had a profound impact upon them all. 
YAM, Youth Aware of Mental Health



















Crative and Performing Arts
