Hi Everyone,

Mr Herps here, as a newbie to Taree High School, this is my first newsletter article having come across from Gloucester High to join the TAS crew here at THS for 2025. Thanks for making me feel welcome and I am enjoying the shorter commute. The newbie comment is not entirely true, as a teacher, yes, but in the 2010's I had three boys come through THS.

The biggest change in my morning commute is the number of cars I encounter - heading into Taree I see more cars in one morning than I did in a week (or two) travelling to Gloucester. I do love the new fuel bill.

In TAS I mostly have Mandatory Technology and Industrial Technology Timber as my load. For this newsletter I will cover the fun and games from our Year 7 RISE students. One of our projects follows the theme of Table Games, the other being a Name Plaque.

We started with a Tic Tac Toe game made from 12 and 19mm thick pine and 12mm diameter hardwood dowels. Students have been great and have worked away to see this through to completion. We have learnt to measure in millimetres, use a rule, and a square, and have completed safety tests on the disc sander and pedestal drill. We used these machine tools to drill holes and sand our jobs to length. I hope you enjoy the pictures

Careers Education: A Promising Start to the Year

It's been an exciting and eventful start to the year for our students, with a range of incursions and excursions designed to inspire and inform. Here's a look at some of the highlights:

Year 12 Universities Roadshow

The year began with Year 12 students attending the Universities Roadshow, featuring four regional universities. The event covered essential topics like how to apply for university (including early entry options), understanding costs, accommodation choices, and what life as a student is really like.

Year 10 EduVenture Program

Later in the term, Year 10 students continued their EduVenture journey, building on the program they started in Year 8. This time, the Taree Universities Campus team partnered with representatives from the Australian National University to deliver a dynamic session. Students explored career immersion using VR goggles, learned how to navigate career pathways, and discovered how to identify their personal skills and strengths, which are essential in choosing the right career.

Health Careers Forum

Year 10 and 11 students had the opportunity to venture outside the school to attend the Health Careers Forum at the University of Newcastle's Taree campus. Here, they interacted with academics, clinicians, and current students, participating in hands-on workshops in various health fields such as medicine, nutrition, physiotherapy, nursing, pharmacy, and more.

Charles Sturt University Explore Day

Senior students also participated in the Charles Sturt University Explore Day, where they experienced university life firsthand. The day included campus tours, interactions with students and lecturers, and engaging in practical sessions covering subjects like Paramedicine, Nursing, Crime and Justice, and Teaching.

Seafood, Marine, and Maritime Careers Immersion

Students in Years 10–12 also explored exciting career opportunities in the seafood and marine industries at the Seafood, Marine, and Maritime Careers Immersion Day in Port Macquarie. Representatives from TAFE NSW, Maritime NSW, the Boating Safety Authority, and Marine Rescue shared valuable insights into education, training, and career pathways in these industries. To top off the day, students enjoyed a scenic lunch and river cruise with Port Adventure Cruises.

Looking Ahead

As we look to the next term, we are excited to welcome VET Ambassadors to the school to share how they have achieved success through vocational education and training. Additionally, senior students will attend the University of Newcastle Open Day and interested Year 10 students will take part in the Bunnings Teen Tradies program. We will also be launching a new Taree Careers website, accessible through the school's webpage. This interactive resource will provide students and caregivers with everything they need to know about careers, job searches, and study options.

It's shaping up to be another inspiring year for our students, with plenty of opportunities to explore their future careers!
